Jennifer Lenz and Virginia Warren	<p>Jennifer Lenz and Virginia Warren have been the chairs of this committee. Jennifer has resigned back in early of November 2008 and took another position. Virginia Warren has also resigned as chair of this committee. Kendra will be chairing this committee until we can locate another chair. Post note: Virginia Warren will be remaining as the chair.</p> <p>Kendra went over the previous minutes.</p>	
Undy 5000 – Anne Bergersen	<p>The Cancer Colon Alliance was notified and received a check for \$13,000. We had over 1200 participants and had raised about \$100,000 dollars. The next Undy 5000 will be on November 21st at the State Capital.</p>	
Fit & 50 Health Check Program – Virginia Warren	<p>The screening started in December 2008. All of the Fit & 50 Health Check program contractors are Mountain Park, North Country Community Health Center and St. Elizabeth'. Virginia was impressed how they implemented their program. They had a great success rate with a return on the IFOBT. The return rate was less than 20% but now in excess of 80%. This has to do with the Patient Navigation that was built into this program. We had applied to CDC for a Colorectal Screening Grant that went in on April 9, 2009 and asked for 1 million dollars for each of 5 years. That is 1 million dollars per year to expand the program in seven sites. Two of those sites would be tribal – Navajo and Hopi. We included this in the grant application. We did receive funds for the Colon Cancer Alliance, a check for a little over \$13,000 to be used for treatment, support or people who are diagnosed through our programs.</p>	

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Shared Events	<p>Virginia Warren: We have finished our reports for the Lay Health Trainer Program that we did with the Komen funds and Komen Southern Affiliate provided support for this program in Tucson. Komen Phoenix Affiliate provided support for the program in the Phoenix area. We had to train a trainer session to teach about breast health and to educate people about breast health, how to do your own self-breast health exam, etc. We did that in Phoenix and people came from across the Northern part of the state and attended. A lot of the folks who attended did not plan on becoming lay health leaders. They were our contractors who wished to enhance their skills about teaching breast health.</p> <p>The concept of the training was that women were selected to be lay health educators; they all received the tools, which is the roll along duffle bag that was packed with materials for teaching. The breast health risk calculator and all sorts of training materials. They went out and were to set up four individual training sessions where they could invite people and have basically education sessions. We reimburse them \$100.00 per session. Eleven women could become trainers. We had 48 training sessions where we had trained over 500 women who were trained by those 11 women.</p> <p>Komen Southern Affiliates: We conducted cultural non-competency training. This is a small grant. We had 15-20 non-ADHS staff attend the cultural non-competency training. The idea was to have another train the trainer concept. They were to take that training into their work place and teach or into their communicating organizations.</p> <p>Through the American Cancer Society grant, we've been doing some interesting work and have been partnering through the community. We did some work through the Komen Foundation in Phoenix for screening. We have an on-site mammography unit</p>	
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that will be on site at the Wellness Community and at St. Joseph's.

Virginia is developing a brochure updating from our new bureau that talks about community health centers, tells about their clientele and gives them a phone number and address for every community health center so that they can pick one that is the closest to them.

Kendra:

Virginia Warren, Anne Bergersen and Kendra were at the hockey game last year as part of the Undy 5000. We were promised to get screen information and acknowledge of our cancer screening event on their jumbo tron. That never happened. We made another attempt at the hockey event and Anne took pictures of the jumbo tron that welcomed the Colon Cancer Alliance and got the screen message.

Save our Parents Day Event:

Kendra and Sherryl participated in the "Save our Parents" which was our second annual event at the U of A in Tucson and ASU in Tempe with the Colon Cancer Foundation. We did a colonoscopy demonstration through a television and scope at the Student Union. We wanted to show the students what a cancerous lesion looks like inside of the intestines. We handed out pens, 800 scratch cards, tote bags and other materials. We will collaborate with St. Joseph's in March 2010. The event was successful. There were having field trips with the students that day.

Mini Grants:

Kendra was able to award two mini grants this year. One went to Mariposa Health Center with a \$10,000 grant. They had put together a proposal on breast cancer awareness. The other went to the Arizona Myeloma Network Organization which is doing breast cancer awareness on the Navajo nation on July 18th. They

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were also awarded a \$10,000 grant.

Diane:

We want to think of ways to identify in-growth into the demographic of the uninsured with the finances that we address. We have in Arizona the School Based Clinics. They're usually in communities where we have a lot of underinsured and uninsured folks. Two Saturday's ago, Diane did a presentation at the Kappa Gamma Delta house annual conference. The school based clinics is trying to do an annual screening event. If we can get 30-40 of the school based community health centers or clinics around the state to provide a screening event during state breast cancer awareness month across the state.

Sharon Jaycox:

Sharon is the PI for the Southern Arizona region. She stated that they had 32 women who had attended. Of those 21 women they were conducting their own workshops. We reached 154 women and maybe more. Sharon is working with the Southwest Prostate Foundation which is offering free screening in Arizona.

Anne Bergensen:

The Colon Cancer Alliance works the Women's Expo which was a two day event, the Wellness community and the Association of the GI Nurses. We had one colorectal surgeon that helped with the event on Sunday. We had the tip cards and other materials. The attendance of the Women's Expo was down to half compared to prior years. The entry fee was \$12.00.

The weekend before that we worked with Khrones and Colitis Foundation of America.

North Country Health Care:

They will be doing an educational lunch and learn event for National Women's Health Week next week. The Colorectal
