1) DHHS, Administration on Children, Youth & Families: Title V State Abstinence Education Grant Program – Deadline: August 30, 2010

Funding Opportunity Number (FON): HHS-2010-ACF-ACYF-AEGP-0123

Eligibility: all 50 states, the District of Columbia and U.S. territories

Number of awards: \$50 million

Purpose: to support decisions to abstain from sexual activity until marriage by providing abstinence education as defined by Section 510(b)(2) of the Social Security Act with a focus on those groups that are most likely to bear children out-of-wedlock. Authorization for the State Abstinence Education Grant Program was extended through June 30, 2014 under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of

2010, Pub.L. 111-148. This funding opportunity announcement will instruct States in application and reporting requirements for funding for FY 2010; future year's awards are contingent upon Congressional re-appropriation of the program.

2) Indian Health Service: SDPI Diabetes Prevention and Healthy Heart Initiatives – Deadline: September 10, 2010

Funding Opportunity Number: HHS-2010-IHS-SDPI-0005

Expected Number of Awards: 66

Estimated Total Program Funding: \$23,300,000

Award Ceiling: \$397,000

Award Floor: \$324,300

Eligibility: Current SDPI Demonstration Project grantees who must demonstrate that they have complied with previous terms and conditions of the SDPI grant in order to receive funding. SDPI Community-Directed grantees that meet the following criteria and can document capacity are also eligible. A. Indian Health Service facility (hospital or clinic). B. Federally-recognized Tribes operating an Indian health program operated pursuant to a contract, grant, cooperative agreement, or compact with the IHS pursuant to the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA), (Pub. L. 93-638). C. Title V Urban Indian Health Program: this includes programs currently under a grant or contract with the IHS under Title V of the Indian Health Care Improvement Act, (Pub. Law 93-437). C. A Consortium of any of the above that can demonstrate a history of successful collaborative efforts in meeting goals and requirements of previous projects or grant programs. Smaller applicants are encouraged to apply as a consortium, especially if their diabetes registry is < 250.

Purpose: to provide funding to selected SDPI grantees to continue or newly implement one of the two programs and to document activities and outcomes. One program is called the Diabetes Prevention Program with primary prevention of diabetes as its goal. The other program, the Healthy Heart Project, is aimed at cardiovascular disease risk reduction in AI/ANs with diabetes. Another purpose of this Cooperative Agreement is to disseminate information and best practices from the original SDPI Demonstration Projects into other AI/AN IHS, Tribal and urban Indian health settings. Both the Diabetes Prevention Program and the Healthy Heart Project award recipients are expected to participate in dissemination activities under this Cooperative Agreement.

3) Centers for Disease Control and Prevention: PS10-1001 HIV Prevention Projects Supplemental Resources to Enhance HIV Prevention Strategies – Deadline: September 13, 2010

Funding Opportunity Number: CDC-RFA-PS10-10010601SUPP10

Expected Number of Awards: 59

Estimated Total Program Funding: \$9,600,000

CFDA Number(s): 93.940

Eligibility: limited to the 59 state and local health departments currently receiving CDC HIV prevention funds under Funding Opportunity Announcement PS10-1001: HIV Prevention Projects. This includes the 50 states, six cities (Chicago, Houston, Los Angeles, New York, Philadelphia, and San Francisco), the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

Purpose: to enable state and local health departments to address gaps within or enhance their HIV prevention portfolio. Jurisdictions should assess current activities within their current HIV prevention plan and, where appropriate and feasible, utilize these funds to further enhance or address gaps.

The Program's other benefits include networking opportunities with other state and national organizations, participation in an annual meeting, and access to NIMH publications free of charge.
