PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Well Woman HealthCheck Program (WWHP) is focused on improving the quality of care for all patients who get screened for cancer. In addition to offering breast and cervical cancer screening, diagnostics, and patient navigation services, the WWHP provides quality improvement training to health systems across the state.

GOAL

To increase women's access to and utilization of quality screening and diagnostic services; to decrease morbidity and mortality from breast and cervical cancer among women who are at risk due to age, medical conditions, income or inadequate access to medical care.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS

The Well Woman HealthCheck Program provides ongoing quality assurance and quality improvement; breast and cervical cancer screening and diagnostics; and patient tracking, follow-up, and case management. The program also provides Care Coordination services to uninsured, underinsured, and insured women to assist them in navigating the complex healthcare system.

INTENDED AUDIENCE

Uninsured and underinsured women ages 40 – 64 years old receive breast and cervical cancer screening and women 21 – 64 years old receive cervical cancer screening. Insured women may be eligible for Care navigation services.

FUNDING SOURCE

The WWHP began in 1993 with funding from the National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program through the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). A combination of funds from the CDC and the State of Arizona fund the program. Since 2002, the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS) has offered the Breast and Cervical Cancer Treatment Program (BCCTP) for uninsured women diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer.



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
